GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT:

Office/Shop

During December, there were approximately 168 work orders completed, 7 meetings, 1 event, 2 holidays', 1 birthday and 4 anniversaries all crammed into the shortened month due to the holidays. There were also a number of cupboards installed, floors done, a few bathrooms repaired/replaced, locks replaced/repaired and some grounds work done with tree wells and trees.

Green Dream

Generally speaking Green Dream has just started their winter services and the overall opinion has been positive. Just a reminder, if you see issues or problem areas that need to be corrected please let the Office know. The Green Dream team is very responsive and willing to correct these problems if they are told about them.

Please remember that members are still responsible as always for clearing snow from their own parking stalls. It is very important that you DO NOT push this snow out into the middle of the parking lot as this makes driving through the lots extremely difficult for everyone else. Any snow removed from stalls should be moved to a grassy area or anywhere else other than parking lots or sidewalks. Green Dream will only be clearing the drive paths in the parking lots as time permits, the sidewalks are their priority.

General

There have been a lot of discussions about the changes in Sarcee Meadows. Some positive, and some not so positive. These discussions range from the decision to upgrade our flooring standard to laminate on the main floor, to fire pits being banned. Everyone knows we have a pretty active community with a number of different opinions and when decisions are made not everyone will be happy with the direction taken. Within Sarcee Meadows we always look to making decisions that are best for the community as a whole, which follow the appropriate laws, legal guidelines, mission statement of SMHC, and Cooperative Principles. In the office we always try to communicate the changes to our Members in a way that will provide understanding of why the change was made and when it will take effect.

My concern is that I hear a number of rumors or perceptions of events that are incorrect and causing misunderstanding. If the office has not communicated a change in a way that provides the information and detail you need, I encourage you to contact someone in the office or on the Board for clarification. If you don't agree with a decision, make your opinion known. Feedback delivered in a respectful way is always appreciated, and even if we can't make immediate changes, this feedback is recorded for future reference during the decision making process.

Marla and her husband Don, were one of the first members of Sarcee Meadows, moving in to our Co-op in 1971. Marla was a pillar of our community. She had a wonderful way of making us feel at ease. Marla showed us every day what it meant to be strong and to be a fighter. The most important thing I have learned from Marla and I will never forget are her wise words. "Live every day to its fullest and celebrate each and every occasion. We don't know what tomorrow is going to bring us so let's make sure we make the most of today." All that Marla did around Sarcee Meadows to keep the office garden and the H gardens looking beautiful is a blessing. I think of Marla and all of her hard work and dedication every time I sit in the garden. Marla was the recipient of the 2015 Volunteer of the Year award. She was named Volunteer of the Year first and foremost because of her work in the gardens. Being 75 years of age and having cataract surgery didn't slow her down one bit. Her passion for beautifying Sarcee Meadows didn't end there. Marla joined the Women's Circle and graciously had about 10 of us ladies, who knew very little about gardening, to her home and spent a couple of hours walking thru the H garden educating us on what plants grow best in Sarcee Meadows and teaching us how to properly plant flowers in our yards. At Christmas time she opened her home to us once again and invited us to learn how to make winter planters for outside. She also taught us how to bake apple pies and cinnamon buns. Marla looked out for her neighbors and was always willing to lend a helping hand. Whether it be driving someone to an appointment, bringing food to neighbors that were ill, helping to research scholarships, and educating newcomers to Sarcee Meadows on what it means to not only live in a co-operative community but to take pride in what we have. Her generosity knows no bounds. Marla brought so much to the Women's Circle. She showered us with special gifts that meant the world to us. Everything from flowers, ornaments, and baking to her wonderful words of wisdom. Her genuine concern for all of us was heartfelt and dearly appreciated. Marla's wonderful personality shone thru in so many ways. The moment she put on her fabulous heart shaped glasses, the smile hit her face and didn't leave until she took them off. People passing by couldn't help but also smile. I was with Marla one day when she was wearing those glasses and a complete stranger stopped us and asked where she found the glasses because she wanted some for herself. She told Marla the glasses very much suited her outgoing personality. Marla loved to travel and shared many great stories of her times traveling with her husband and mom. I will always be proud to call her my neighbor, confidant, mentor and dear friend. Marla was loved by many and will be deeply missed. She was a class act right to the end. Marla didn't let too many people know how ill she had become as she didn't want people to fuss over her or treat her differently. For her it was business as usual right till the end. She was still sending out Christmas baking to friends and family less than a week before she passed. All of these words come to my mind when I think about Marla. 

Jumpstart to Success (JTS)

Quick Facts + Workshop Dates 2016/2017



Jumpstart to Success has 3 interventions GBES, ESWE and WE. GBES is the most basic interventions with the ESWE and WE being increasingly advanced. The ESWE and WE are designed for clients with increasing levels of independence and job readiness. Depending on the needs of the client, they may attend one or two of the interventions.

Group Based Employability Skills (GBES)

This is a 6 week life and essential skills workshop designed to ensure that participants gain the necessary skills, tools, information and support to adapt to Canadian society, integrate into the community, the Canadian workplace and succeed on the job. Participants will receive Alberta's minimum wage, currently \$12.20 per hour, and transit tickets/pass while in the workshop. Assistance with child care costs is available.

Workshop topics include: effective communication, problem solving, decision making, money management, time management, personal management, health and wellness, social and employability skills, and Canadian culture. This workshop includes numerous group speakers and 3-4 field trips to various cultural and historical venues in Calgary.

GBES Workshop Dates

July 18, 2016 - August 26, 2016 September 19, 2016 – October 28, 2016 November 14, 2016 – December 23, 2016 January 23, 2017 – March 3, 2017 April 3, 2017 - May 12, 2017

Employability Skills through Work Experience (ESWE)

This intervention starts with a 2 week workshop that provides the necessary tools to immigrant youth to find and sustain full time permanent employment in Canada. Participants receive Alberta's minimum wage, currently \$11.20 per hour for their attendance, transit tickets to attend the workshop and assistance with child care costs. At any time during the workshop or upon completion of the workshop the participant will begin a 10 week work experience. At the end of the 10 weeks, the participant will be offered permanent employment if the employer is satisfied with their performance. JTS staff will remain in contact with them to assist with any questions or concerns that may arise during their employment.

Workshop topics include: interview skills, resume and cover letter writing, job search strategies, Canadian workplace culture, and how to communicate your skills and knowledge effectively.

ESWE Workshop Dates

September 5- 16, 2016 October 31 - November 11, 2016 January 4- 17, 2017 March 13 -24, 2017 May 22 – June 2, 2017

Work Experience (WE)

This intervention is designed for clients that already have good skills in resume and cover letter writing, interviews, and Canadian culture but require additional support around job search. Clients will be assisted with job search and once they begin their work experience individual support is offered for 12 weeks. Participants can start this intervention at any time. Transit passes may be available to those with financial needs.

Minimum qualifying program requirements

15 - 30 years of age

Permanent Resident, Citizen or Refugee Claimant with a Notice of Decision Letter Not currently attending school full time

A minimum English Canadian Language Benchmark of 3

Not in receipt of Employment Insurance (EI) or Maternity leave benefits within the last 5 years




