## Office/Shop

During May, there were approximately 190 work orders completed, 12 meetings including the Big Budget meeting, a SACHA Board course, 1 staff anniversary, a holiday, and 1 birthday. There were also a number of cupboards installed, ducts cleaned, floors done, a few bathrooms repaired/replaced, plans for building condition assessment finalized, and locks replaced/repaired.

## Now that it is Warm

With the warm weather there have been a lot of traffic through Sarcee Meadows, both members and others. Just a few reminders for the summer season.

- Please pick up after your dogs. Nobody likes to find dog dirt on their yard or in parks. This is also a City Bylaw.
- Dogs must be licensed and on a leash unless in an off-leash area or in a secure fenced yard.
- Cats must be licensed and on a leash or remain on your property. Free roaming cats create messes in your neighbour's gardens and are in danger from wildlife.
- Remember that yards can't be mowed when filled with toys, furniture, litter or pet debris. There will be a mowing schedule out shortly, but if your yard is full it won't get mowed.
- There have been a lot of chicken bones found on the property, we don't know if it is people littering or the birds leaving inedible portions of their meal. If you see any bones it would be appreciated if you got rid of them in the proper bins, but this is also a "heads-up" to pet owners that the bones are out there.

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

## **CO-OP EDUCATION:**

## **Inclusive Co-op Communities**

Housing co-ops have historically been welcoming places where all members have the right to live with dignity, free from harassment and discrimination. It is important to remember that all co-op members play a role in making sure their co-op is a safe place to live. This is about building awareness and fostering an understanding about issues for all members in our community

## What is an inclusive co-op community?

Inclusive co-op communities are where all members are welcomed and respected. Some members may experience discrimination or harassment in their daily lives and in their housing co-op. Housing co-ops can create a safer place for their members and respond to all forms of discrimination and harassment.

## Safer spaces are where members:

- treat all members with respect
- do not tolerate hurtful language, jökes or actions
- believe that all members have a right to be heard
- do not assume gender identity, gender expression, pronouns (he/she/they, him/her/them)

## **Human rights!**

It is important to recognize the rights of our community. All Canadian citizens are guaranteed equal protection against discrimination regardless of race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, family status, or disability. Each province and territory has a human rights code that protects people from discrimination based on specific grounds like race or sexual orientation. Information about human rights codes is available online or by calling your provincial or territorial human rights commission office.

## What can co-op members do?

YOU can help create inclusive co-op communities by being an ally. An ally is someone who supports equal rights for our communities.

#### An ally

- is compassionate
- is a good listener
- is open to talking and learning
- uses supportive and affirming language
- recognizes everyone's dignity and worth
- stops hurtful behaviour when possible
- Listen to the experience and ask how you can provide support.
- Part of being an ally is addressing discrimination when it happens, or taking steps to make sure it doesn't happen again. It is important to deal with discrimination in safe and respectful ways. If dealing with someone's behaviour doesn't feel safe, bring it up with your co-op's board.

## **CO-OPERATIVE PRINCIPLES**

Co-operative worldwide are governed by seven co-operative principles. These principles, adopted at the International Co-operative Alliance's Centennial Congress in September 23, 1995, are outlined in the ICA's Statement on the Co-operative Identity.

## STATEMENT ON THE CO-OPERATIVE IDENTITY

#### **DEFINITION:**

A Co-operative is an autonomous association of persons united voluntarily to meet their common economic, social, and cultural needs and aspirations through a jointly-owned and democratically-controlled enterprise.

#### **VALUES:**

Co-operatives are based on the values of self-help, self-responsibly, democracy, equality, equity, and solidarity. In the tradition of their founders, co-operative members believe in the ethical values of honesty, openness, social responsibility, and caring for others.

## THE CO-OP PRINCIPLES FOR HOUSING CO-OPS:

The co-operative principles are guidelines by which co-operatives put their values into practice.

## 1. Voluntary and Open Membership

Membership in a housing co-op is open to all who can use the co-op's services and accept the responsibilities of being a member, without discrimination.

#### 2. Democratic Member Control

Housing co-ops are controlled by their members. Each member has one vote. Housing co-ops give members the information they need to make good decisions and take part in the life of the co-op.

### 3. Members' Economic Participation

Members contribute financially to the co-op and share in the benefits of membership. The co-op does not pay a return on the members' shares or deposits. Instead it sets aside reserves for the future and charges the members only what it needs to operate soundly.

## 4. Autonomy and Independence

Housing co-ops are independent associations. They follow the laws that apply to them and their agreements with governments or other organizations. But the members control the co-op.

### 5. Education. Training and Information

Housing co-ops offer education and training to the members, directors and staff so that everyone can play a full role in the life of the co-op. Housing co-ops find ways to tell the public what they are and what they do.

### 6. Co-operation among Co-operatives

By organizing together in federations, housing co-ops grow stronger and help to build a healthy co-op movement. Where they can, housing co-ops use the services of co-op businesses to meet their needs.

## 7. Concern for Community

Housing co-ops work to build strong communities inside and outside the co-op. They help to improve the quality of life for others and they take care to protect the environment.

## BLOOD SWEAT AND TEARS (First in a Series)

Told in 2017 from the memory of Carol Davis

## WHAT WERE WE THINKING!

In summer 1971 when the first residents moved into our Co-operative it was still very much a construction site. The first homes to be complete were along Sarcee Road. Most of us who were scheduled to move in were coming from rental accommodations. We had given our notice to our Landlords and had to move. At the absolute last moment there was a glitch with the electrical transformers so there was no electricity in the units. That problem was ultimately resolved by the Co-op having to buy the Transformers rather than have them supplied by the City. But I digress – that is another story!

It was July 1971. It was HOT. We did have running water in the units but no electricity and no hot water. I remember the COLD showers after long days of hot work. I was also three months pregnant and suffering morning (make that all day) sickness!

The perimeter sidewalks had been poured but there was this huge area of dirt before the sod started. Someone had miscalculated and the dirt was the City easement but the Co-op had to maintain it – and that meant sodding it as well. Another huge unplanned cost for our Co-op.

Some short time later we came home from work to find stakes in the ground. I remember telling my husband that those stakes marked where trees would be planted. One of those stakes was very close to the corner of our home and I did not think it was a good place for a tree. But not one to openly question authority, I waited till the dark of night to sneak out and move the stake!! Felt very guilty about that until a few days later when I got home from work to find a huge Evergreen Tree planted where that stake was now located – still much too close to the house for a big tree but thankfully out a bit further than the original stake had been. That tree is still alive and well, but far too close to the house! Such was the case with many of our original plantings.

We got lots of large evergreens and Poplar trees in the original planting. Many did not survive but over the years we added many more trees of various types. I think we succeeded in creating the "Park with Homes in it" that was a vision of one of our Founding Fathers.

The Co-op was designed to be "open spaces" No Fences. Short divider fences were included to separate patios but past that point it was intended to be open common space.

I remember the first fence approval. Late at night at the end of a long Board meeting we were asked to approve a fence on a unit. Now I remember the thought process that happened. No policy existed. Why not let the member build a fence. Take as much space as you like. Nobody else is going to want a fence. WHAT WERE WE THINKING!!!

Of course over the years Fences have been a major bone of contention, Because of the layout of our buildings not all yards are equal in size. Fences and Hedges rapidly sprung up. (Guess a few people did want a fence!) Lots of "Grandfathering in" policies had to be considered. Care and maintenance have been issues. Acceptable colours – an issue. That arose from discovering a member had done a lovely job of painting his fence in stripes! A thing of beauty to some. Not so much for others.

I have a good sized fence around my home. Last summer when it was time to paint that fence I began to question why we wanted it to begin with!! As Tom Sawyer found out painting a fence is a big job!!

In day one each unit had a small "lean-to type" shed at the front door. That was for Garbage. In day one our two person maintenance staff was expected to physically collect our garbage and take it to the parking lot large garbage containers. It was later determined that most members were perfectly capable of hauling their own garbage to the parking lot bin and better use could be made of our limited staff time!

The original parking lot garbage bins were on cement pads along fire lane areas in parking lots. They had a screening fence on three sides. The Garbage Truck was a side loader truck. Workers were often not too careful with repositioning the garbage bins once dumped and those fences took a beating. One day, with very short notice, the City advised that they would be using front loader garbage trucks and we needed to find new locations for our garbage bins to accommodate the front loader truck. Another hasty decision had to be made and the parking lot islands were about the only location that could be used. Only the "J" Parking Lot did not have an island so they have to use the bins in other lots.

That is just a few memories from our early days. I encourage other members to share their memories as well.



## MEMORIAL GARDEN IN FRONT OF B50

D. Lynne Thorpe lived in Sarcee Meadows for many years, first in 'D' section and later in 'K'. Lynne was a self-taught Accountant who worked for many years as the Controller for the Calgary Flames Hockey Team.

Lynne served as a Director and Treasurer of Sarcee Meadows for several terms. During her volunteer time she was responsible for simplifying mysterious financial statements and budgets for many members. She just had a way of making complex issues easier to understand for many people.

After retiring from her stressful job with the Flames, Lynne spent a summer working as SM Gardener—now that is a change in career! As always she adapted and won the hearts of many more friends.

Regrettably, Lynne lost her battle with cancer in April 1999. Soon after that, her husband, John, provided the funds to SM to both build and maintain the garden in front of B50 in Lynne's memory.
