GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT:

(It's Miller Time!)

Office/Shop

During June, there were approximately 221 work orders completed, 13 meetings, the June Membership Meeting, 1 staff anniversary, a holiday, and 1 birthday. There were also a number of cupboards installed, ducts cleaned, floors done, a few bathrooms repaired/replaced, plans for building condition assessment finalized, and locks replaced/repaired.

Historical Housing Charge Increases

At the Member's Meeting in June there were some questions about housing charge increases, and it was thought that historically SMHC has never had increases as high as in the past couple of years. Included after my report is the historical record of housing charges in SMHC. From 1971 to 2001 increases were generally applied as percentages based on the size of the unit. From 2002 on increases were applied as a flat dollar rate regardless of the size of the unit.

Where did the Mortgage Payment Go?

Members who attended the June Members Meeting to discuss the budget also asked where the mortgage payment went. Near the beginning of 2013 Sarcee Meadows became mortgage free. The average portion of housing charges monthly that went to the mortgage payment from each unit was \$200.

The chart below outlines where this \$200 has been allocated.

The total increase in these 4 categories is \$192.72 with the majority going to Internal Subsidy and Replacement Reserves (72% of the original \$200 mortgage payment). This leaves \$7 per unit per month (\$31,920.00 per year) of the mortgage payment left to cover all other increases in costs associated with running and maintaining SMHC.

ECO ALLEY - NEWS YOU CAN USE:

DID YOU KNOW?

"Green" recycling is coming, and many things are happening in the background to prepare Sarcee Meadows for the changes. The City has a target of November to have all multifamily properties recycling their organic ("green") matter. It will be a City bylaw that we must adhere to.

Here is a general list of some of the "green" items to be recycled using <u>certified compostable</u> bags:

All food (raw and cooked): Plate scrapings; Meat, fish, poultry, shellfish and bones; Fruits and vegetables (remove any stickers); Bread, pasta, noodles, rice, beans, couscous, grains, crackers, cereal; Eggs, eggshells and dairy products; Cooking oil, lard, shortening, butter, sauces, grease, dips, salad dressing, mayonnaise and gravy; Pastries, cookies, cakes and muffins; Nuts, seeds, pits, chips, popcorn and candy

Food soiled paper: Paper plates, coffee grounds, coffee filters and tea bags; Food-soiled paper towels, napkins and tissues

Yard waste: Leaves and cones; Plants and flowers; Branches, twigs, hedge pruning; Grass clippings and sod; Weeds; Garden soil, sand and untreated mulch; Christmas trees; Hay

Pet Waste: Dog waste and kitty litter (all varieties); Animal bedding (from pet cages); Pet food and treats; Pet fur, hair or feathers

Other: Cold barbeque or fireplace ashes; untreated lumber; Wood shavings/ sawdust; wooden popsicle sticks, chopsticks and toothpicks

The "no" items. Please keep these items OUT of your green recycling:

- No plastic, oxo-biodegradable or biodegradable bags. If using a bag, only use certified compostable bags.
- No diapers, wipes or sanitary products
- No food or beverage packaging
- No plastic plates or cutlery
- No painted or treated wood
- No fruit or vegetable stickers

Keep up the "blue" cart recycling we do now (for example: mixed paper, paper coffee/fountain drink cups, plastic, jugs, bottles, packaging and food containers with the recycling symbol 1-7, metal food cans, metal lids, clean aluminum foil plates and containers, clean glass jars and bottles, refundable beverage containers).



Why is it important to collect food and yard waste?

Food and yard waste **does not** turn into **soil, compost or anything useful** when it is **buried** in the Landfill because there is no oxygen. Instead it releases **methane**, a harmful greenhouse gas and **leachate**, a toxic liquid from garbage which has to be collected and treated to **protect** the environment. By diverting our food and yard waste, we will reduce our dependence on landfills, minimize the harmful **environmental** effects of food and yard waste in the landfills, and produce **useful new resources**, such as, **compost**.

Compost is full of nutrients and rich in organic materials. It is often called "black gold" by gardeners for the many benefits it provides.

Consider options to prevent food waste

While some food waste is not edible for consumption--like eggshells, banana peels and bones--plenty of our food is perfectly edible. In Calgary it is estimated that over 50 percent of our food waste could be prevented. Consider ways to **reduce** food waste in your home; such as weekly menu planning, buying only what you need and storing food properly.

Remember

Items such as furniture, motor oil, electronics, and household chemicals are not **accepted** in the garbage, recycling or food and yard waste containers.

By diverting our food and yard waste we can significantly reduce our garbage and keep this material out of the landfill.

Don't let change be your enemy ... let it be your teacher.

PROPERTY ENHANCEMENT COMMITTEE:

Home Maintenance Tips:

- Keep water off the floors and counters to avoid water damage.
- Leave bathroom fans on for a least 10 minutes after baths or showers to get the moisture out.
- Do not block cold air returns.
- Do not put grease down drains, use paper towels to wipe grease out and put in garbage.
- Keep the down spouts down when it is raining.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

With there being much discussion about Green Dream Landscapes during the June 15th, 2017 Members Meeting one of our members, Slawa Gruszczynska, requested that the Newsletter Committee reprint her Letter to the Editor from last year's Summer Newsletter. Here it is again:

"Sarcee Meadows is Green Again

It was such an uplifting experience to see many members actively participating in the last General meeting on June 16. People took the time to do their homework and prepared / addressed questions relevant to the budget deliberations.

This vital discussion was an indication that members feel comfortable with Management and the Board again to dialog and be part of a democratic process, and wish to see our Cooperative strong and sustainable.

I was planning to line up by the microphone and provide a few words of clarification, but after a while I decided to write it down and share my feedback with the members through the Connections newsletter instead.

As a past Board member for almost 5 years, and being actively involved in a few aspects of our Cooperative, I became familiar with the past green space maintenance practices, before Green Dream Landscapes came to our rescue.

The Budget for overall grounds keeping is almost the same amount and it has always been a part of our Financial Statements for many, many years.

What is different, is the way the green space, other grounds maintenance, and snow removal processes are being managed.

How?

Historically:

- Early in the spring each year, our Administration would place Job Postings to recruit Seasonal Workers for grounds maintenance in the Connections Newsletter and through flyers.
- Depending on the status of economy in Alberta/Calgary, sometimes several applications would be submitted, or just a few.
- Our full time staff would need to:
- Screen the applications/resumes.
- Select candidates for interviews
- Schedule interviews
- Conduct the interviews
- > Make a decision, who will be qualified for hire
- Hire seasonal staff
- Process the paper work
- Coordinate and conduct the orientation

➤ New staff would need to be taken around our big Co-op several times to be comfortable with the scope of work. They would need to be shown where the common grounds and members' perimeters were.

 \succ The temporary staff would need to be introduced by the full time staff on what to do, where and how, where the supplies were stored, how our fleet works, access to the Maintenance tools, and how our cooperative worked.

The young seasonal workers very frequently would need to be constantly supervised and searched for, as they would not perform in a responsible way, despite orientations, guidelines and radio system in place.
 Very often, in the middle if the training or right after, these newly hired workers would quit without notice or would not report to work without notice. Or they would find better paid jobs or easier jobs.

While our full time staff were busy hiring, orienting, educating the seasonal workers, in the meantime, work orders were piling up.

 \succ To accommodate both needs, our full time staff would frequently have to work overtime to fulfill the members' needs and try to organize the grounds and seasonal maintenance.

Each year, the Administration tried a different approach, without any success.

 \succ Our grounds were not well maintained, garbage piling up under the trees, corners. The irrigation system has been damaged beyond repair by seasonal workers driving over it with golf carts and other equipment, without respect to our property.

Sarcee Meadows's budget not only had to offset the wages for seasonal workers, overtime for our full time staff and repair numerous damages. Most likely several of the Maintenance shop supplies have been taken as well.

> Occasionally Workers Compensation Board expenses had to be covered as well.

In conclusion..., the Budget Line was always there.

Grounds Maintenance was built into the budget for many years in the past and it is there now, but the system did not work and it cost us the same if not more.

Until the day, when Green Dream Landscapes came to our doorstep and proposed a mutually beneficial, professional, and sustainable solution.

Green Dream Landscapes have qualified and affordable staff, they know what they are doing, they are honest, polite and super-efficient.

Miracles, take time.

For a month and a half, Green Dream Landscapes were removing and raking a huge amount of garbage and debris resulting from many years of neglect. Each square foot of green space, each tree and shrub had to be taken care of.

But what a difference it is to see our grounds now. Revived and well-trimmed grass, no garbage under the trees, hedges and shrubs trimmed.

Some of members are not able to care for backyards, shrubs trimming, and grass cutting due the lack of skills, ability or mobility issues.

With Green Dream Landscapes' extended services that include care of our backyards and snow removal to the doorstep, some of our aging members can extend their independent living for many years and continue to be part of the Sarcee Meadows big family.

And if members are in doubt, fortunately we can learn more about finances and Sarcee Meadows' operations by becoming members of committees and of the Board, and have a first had experience.

COMMUNITY LANDS (Second in a series):

Provided from the Memory Bank of Carol Davis 2017

To the best of my knowledge the City of Calgary has long had a requirement for new developments to provide community space. I think the criteria is 10%

When our Co-op was in the planning stages we were aware of this and as a result the large central park was planned as well as other communal spaces like the areas that today are occupied by the Tot Lot and the Memorial Garden.

Blue prints were done. All was approved. And then, very late in the game, the City dropped a bombshell. They would not accept the green communal spaces as our 10% requirement for Community Lands because they were on the inside of the project.

So at a very late stage in the planning everything had to be shifted. The north eastern boundary of the property – where the Rutland Park Hall, Skate Shack and skating rink now sit – was emptied of our planned buildings and parking lots and left vacant for "community reserve". 40^{th} Avenue as it now sits was also part of this land. This shift made it necessary to move everything.

I cannot begin to imagine the amount of work this would have entailed for our Architect who would have to completely redo his blue prints. (And do not forget that in the late 1960's this was all done manually - no computers!!)

In the original plans we provided one parking stall per unit plus 50% additional parking which was to be for Visitors. Regrettably after the "shift" the 50% extra stalls were not evenly distributed between all areas of the co-op and a great number of them ended up in the "L" parking lot.

Of course it was not long before members were wanting additional parking. The decision was made to take away some of the visitor stalls and turn them into stalls that could be rented to members.

Policing Visitor parking abuses is an issue that goes back to the beginning of our co-op. Some problems just never go away!

It was years later that the Community Hall etc. was developed on the land that originally belonged to Sarcee Meadows.
