GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT:

<u>B50</u>

In B50 we are currently working with our auditor for the year end and getting things ready to report to the Board. Once this is all finalized it will be presented to the Membership at the January 31, 2018 Member's Meeting. There were a number of cupboards installed, floors done, a few bathrooms repaired/replaced, and locks replaced/repaired.

The building condition assessment planning meeting was postponed until January 13, 2018 due to key people not being able to attend the previously scheduled meeting. When this planning meeting is completed information will be shared with the Membership.



Rutland Park Hall Garbage Bins

There have been reports of people using the Rutland Park Hall garbage bins for their regular household garbage. This bin is for Hall use only and does cost Rutland Park community more to empty it if it is regularly filled up by garbage that is not from Hall use. If any of our members are using the Rutland Park Hall garbage bins, please stop and use the garbage bins provided in the Sarcee Meadows Parking lots.

Organics, Garbage, Recycling

We are still working out the issues of the new waste, organics and recycling program. We are working with Waste Management to fine tune things. There is an investigation on where we can add a bin for Shop waste i.e. carpet materials etc. These materials have traditionally been put in the regular garbage bins. There are no regulations against this at this time if we are careful with weight limits, but with the reduced space there is an issue with this material filling up the bins.

Just a reminder that mixed recycling (paper, plastics, cans and bottles) is handled the same way we have for years. Leave your recycling on your stairs on your scheduled day for it to be picked up. Organics recycling goes in the small bins in the parking lots. General garbage goes in the larger bins in the parking lots.

ECO ALLEY – NEWS YOU CAN USE – REDUCE, REUSE, REPURPOSE, RECYCLE

BE AN ETHICAL SHOPPER THIS HOLIDAY

- 1. Buy local when you can. This helps the local economy and reduces the influence and power of large-scale corporations. Calgary has many local artists and artisans who have remarkable products for gift giving.
- 2. Purchase gifts from Thrift Shops, especially those that support a local business or charity. It is a great way to find a gift without hurting your wallet or the planet.
- 3. Make it yourself: Homemade gifts are always the best, and even something simple like baked sweets make others happy, while not using up goods that go into the landfill. You can even make new things from old, such as upcycling t-shirts into bags!
- 4. Buy quality: when all else fails, buy quality goods---an item that won't wear out fast, or can be repaired, will last longer and avoid filling up the landfills with fast fashion items and obsolete electronics.
- 5. Make donations instead: Sometimes the best gift is to make a donation in someone else's name. Your money goes to a good cause that needs it, instead of corporations, and your friends and family know that the contribution will be meaningful.



COMPOSTING: TOP 5 THINGS YOU THOUGHT WERE COMPOSTABEL BUT ARE NOT

- 1. Gum: Chewing gum and bubble gum have Synthetic rubbers, plastics and or waxes as their base. This item is Biodegradable, NOT, compostable. Trash it!
- 2. Wax paper and Butcher paper: Even if these items are associated with food, they have linings that cannot be compostable. Trash it! Parchment paper, however is OKAY to put in the green compost bin.
- **3.** Dryer Lint and Dryer Sheets: These products are made of Synthetics, so they are to be TRASHED! Need a GREENER solution to dryer sheets? Use a dryer ball, especially ones made of wool.
- **4. Biodegradable bags:** Biodegradable is NOT the same as Compostable. Biodegradable products decompose into smaller pieces. They DO NOT become fertilizer like compost does. Biodegradable bags go into the Trash Bin!



5. Sawdust or small blocks of Treated Wood: such as creosote-treated wood, pallets, pressure treated wood, plywood, particle board - THESE PRODUCTS CANNOT GO INTO THE GREEN BINS!

FACIAL TISSUE AND TOILET PAPER

These are **compostable**. However, if the tissue has been soiled with make-up, nail enamel (synthetics), cleaning supplies, chemicals or blood, put them in your **trash bin**.

ALUMINUM FOIL:

Recyclable: Wash off the foil and crumble into a ball to recycle. If it is covered in lots of oil, bits of stuck on food, put in the trash bin!

FRUIT FLIES:

Still troubled with these pesky flies? Try this Fruity Fly Trap:

Oranges that are past their best days work effectively when they are cut into small pieces and put into a glass mug or bowl. Put saran wrap, or a wrapper across the top and cut tiny slits in the top of wrapper, to allow flies to enter. Once in, they cannot get out! When you have a good collection of flies toss the oranges and wrapper out.

CO-OP EDUCATION:

A Corporate Community

Do you realize that you are a **Shareholder** of a company with a multi-million dollar annual budget? Yes, Sarcee Meadows Housing Cooperative **LTD**. (SMHC) is a corporation. As a **Shareholder** you have the democratic right to elect a Board of Directors to govern the corporation. SMHC holds their Board elections each January at the Annual General Meeting (AGM), where those Directors whose three year terms are completed are either reelected or retire so new Directors take their place on the Board. And not only do you get to vote for the new Directors, you can become one! The Elections Committee will be providing all housing units with an application form, watch for it in your mailbox, which you can fill in and return to the Office.

As do most corporate boards, SMHC hires a General Manager who, in turn, oversees the necessary administration and maintenance staff to run the day-to-day business of the company. The Board of Directors at SMHC also have the ability to create or dissolve committees as they deem necessary, according to our By-Laws. They have determined that there are to be five core committees that are vital to the corporate welfare of the coop. Those five committees are Finance, Maintenance, Membership, Personnel and Grievance. The functions that these committees perform are critical to the existence of the coop. As a **Shareholder**, don't you agree that the people on those five committees should be people who have a strong desire to serve the coop in the area in which they have a special interest or perhaps some related experience? That's why the Board has decided that **Members** of those core committees should apply for their desired position, and be selected, democratically, by the Board. **Members** on these five committees can serve up to five years before they must step down.

But we who are **Shareholders** here in SMHC are in the unique position of also being **Members** of a Community! How great is that? As a **Member** you are able to determine what you want to see happening in this community in which you and your children live. So to achieve the type of community life you want to be a part of, the Board has created a number of other committees that, while they're not essential to the Corporate side of the coop, are very important to the Community side of the coop. Some of them are social in nature and some are responsible for a few of the housekeeping tasks that a community our size needs. SMHC **Members** are free to join any of these other committees without going through the formality of submitting an application form. All of the committees are listed, along with the chair's name, on the last page of the Connections Newsletter. Contact them if you wish to sit-in on a committee meeting so see what they do.

As a **Shareholder** and as a **Member**, you have one vote, or a voice, in the operations of this **Corporate Community**. But, out of 380 housing units, one vote, as important as that is, is only a small voice. If you would like to have a bigger voice, then perhaps you should consider applying for or joining one of our committees, or even the Board of Directors, where you will have one voice out of ten or so, instead of just one voice out of 380. There you can participate in discussions to set policies and procedures, and more, not merely voting on what others are trying to put into place. Will you take up the challenge and the opportunity to give yourself a bigger voice?

A Brit's Special and Funny moments in Canada

Over my life here there have been so many memories that come to mind. Outstanding among them is the way that my father, Jim Jenkinson, wholeheartedly adopted Canada as his new home and shared that love of country with his children. On summer evenings after the family had supper he would load us all in the car and we'd be off to explore the backroads around Calgary. Our trips would take us west mostly into the foothills and some of winding little used gravel lanes that crisscrossed the very rural countryside back in the late 50's and early 60's. And always we would pass through one or another of the small towns like Okotoks or Cochrane to stop for ice cream to top off our evening adventure.

I was so grateful and excited to move into Sarcee Meadows as a single mom with my daughter Sandra, who was just 5 when we found our home here. A very special memory for me, which was somewhat humorous too, came when I had bought my first little used car. As I had parked it I had realized that the windshield washer fluid indicator was on. So I put up the hood and went to the trunk where I knew I had a full bottle of fluid ready to go. As I was doing this two different unit doors facing the parking lot opened and two members called out together "Is everything okay? Do you need help?" Well of course I explained and we all shared a chuckle because it was only washer fluid, but how wonderful to be in a community that looked out for one another.

The one thing that I can say for sure about living in Calgary is that it has been an adventure. Last April 22, 2017 was the 60th Anniversary of my arrival from England with Dad & Mom so Calgary has been home for most of my life. That constancy of place has not jaded or bored me at all. In fact, when I'm travelling or speaking with new acquaintances about my hometown, I will always tell them that I feel deeply privileged to be able to live here; in a country that is spectacular in its diversity of landscapes and people, in a city that has grown by leaps and bounds offering so much in entertainment, culture and sports that one could never claim boredom and to be just a short drive from the awe inspiring Rocky Mountains and all the National Parks have to offer.

Recipe - Maid of Honour Tarts (England)

Makes: 12 maids of honour tarts

Ingredients:

250g short crust pastry 85g raspberry jam 1 egg 100g fine granulated sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons milk 140g ground almonds

Method:

Prep: 20 min > Cook: 15 min > Ready in: 35 min

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200 C / Gas 6. Grease twelve 5cm tart tins.
- 2. Roll out pastry. Stamp out twelve circles a little larger than the tins, about 7cm in diameter. Pat pastry circles into greased tart tins. Spread 1 teaspoon of jam into bottom of each pastry case.
- 3. Beat together egg, sugar and salt until light in colour. Mix in milk and almonds. Spoon an equal amount of filling into each pastry case.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 15 minutes, or till filling is set and tops are golden brown.

Day of the Dead is a Mexican holiday celebrated throughout Mexico, in particular the Central and South regions, and by people of Mexican ancestry living in other places, especially the United States. It is acknowledged internationally in many other cultures. The multi-day holiday focuses on gatherings of family and friends to pray for and remember friends and family members who have died, and help support their spiritual journey. In 2008, the tradition was inscribed in the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity by UNESCO.

Recipe – Salsa (Mexico)

Ingredients:

5 avocados 6 or 7 tomatoes 1/2 large onion or 1 small lemon juice (approximately 5 pieces) lime juice (approximately 5 pieces) 1/2 a bunch of Cilantro use just the top (cut the ends) Salt to taste Jalapeño peppers all you want or Serrano pepper (test before you prepare) sometimes it's not spicy sometimes it is really spicy

Way to do the salsa:

- 1. Chop onion finely with peppers and let them repost for a half an hour with the lime and lemon juice and sea salt, in the meantime ...
- 2. Chop all ingredients. When all is chopped first add the tomatoes to the onion and pepper mixture, after that the cilantro, mix very good. If needed add more salt. Add the previously chopped avocado and mix very gently
- 3. Grab some taco chips and enjoy!!

Amira Mohamed and Cadigia Mohamud - Representing Somalia



Recipe – Sambusa with ground beef (Somalia)

Ingredients for the filling:

1 pounds ground beef

- 2 tablespoons oil
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 2 teaspoons coriander powder
- 2 tablespoons cilantro, finely chopped
- green onion, chopped
- 2 teaspoon cumin powder
- 2 teaspoon cardamom powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 green chili
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- oil for frying

Ingredients for the flour paste:

¹/₄ cup all-purpose flour ¹/₄ cup water, or as needed

Ingredients for the Sambusa wrappers:

3 cups plain all-purpose flour2 table spoon oil1 cup Luke warm watersalt

To make the Sambusa wrappers

- 1. Mix the flour, oil and the salt, while using a fork mix in the water slowly, knead for 5-10 minutes until smooth and pliable dough.
- 2. Form the dough into a ball and coat the outside with oil. Cover and set it aside for about 15 minutes.
- 3. Heat a skillet on a medium-low heat.
- 4. Knead the dough again and divide it into 8 equal portions
- 5. Form each portion into a ball.
- 6. Using two balls at a time roll both in 5inch brush one with oil and put the other one on top. Press with your fingers to make sure they line up, roll on a floured surface to flatten with a rolling pin about 10-11 inches in diameter.
- 7. Cut into four pieces with a sharp knife, roll each piece again so it keeps its shape.
- 8. Place each piece on the warm skillet and leave it each side to dry it out (make sure you don't leave it too long).
- 9. Remove and let it cool slightly then separate the two slowly without tearing the wrappers.
- 10. Cover with a towel and continue to repeat the same steps until you have finished all pieces.

To make the filling:

- 1. Cook the meat in a skillet with a little oil on a medium heat.
- 2. Add the onions and green chili, stir until tender
- 3. Then add coriander, cumin, cardamom, salt, and pepper, garlic, green onion and the cilantro. Cook briefly for few minutes
- 4. Let the filling cool at room temperature.

Flour paste

In a small bowl, mix flour and the water to make a smooth paste.

Assembly

- 1. Pick one the sambusa wrappers with your hands and fold it into a cone shape seal it with flour paste.
- 2. Fill the cone with the filling and close the top into a triangle shape and seal it with the flour paste.
- 3. Pinch the edges so that it is completely sealed.
- 4. Continue filling the rest of the sambusas.
- 5. Heat the oil in frying pan, fry the sambusas until golden brown.
- 6. Remove and drain on paper towels.
- 7. Serve while warm

Country of Origin – Myself: Holland (The Netherlands)

Country of Origin - My ancestors: Norway, Germany, Holland

Why did you (or your ancestors) leave the homeland for Canada? I came with my parents who immigrated

to Canada in 1960. They were looking for a new life. My dad considered himself a "delayed pioneer".

Former occupations for yourself and/or family members: I was a junior high school teacher. My father was an artist and the Art Director for CFCN. My mother was an Office Manager / Bookkeeper for an insurance broker.

What were some of the adjustments you had to make when you arrived in Calgary? Learning to speak English daily. My father was determined that we would become Canadian. To help me, I was sent to summer camp and came home swearing like a trooper. It was difficult for my parents to allow me the same freedoms that Canadian kids had.

Special memories in Canada / Calgary: Being terrified to say anything in English except "excuse me". Being amazed at the tallest building in Calgary at the time – Elveden House – which was 12 stories tall. The wild and unpopulated landscape west of Calgary

A memory that is special to you: There are two – the first was the sun setting over Lake Superior as the train headed west. It seemed like an ocean! The second was my first view of the Prairies. Miles and miles of nothing except grain elevators in the distance.
