Green Dream

There was a survey sent in the Summer newsletter with regards to Green Dream. This was a result of some concerns voiced during the June Member's meeting. Of all of the responses received only 8 out of 380 units were less than positive. Please see the following pages for more detailed information.

Question from a Member (June Members' Meeting)

Question - "I would like to know and I am sure other members would as well, just why the employees' salaries are recorded as one lump sum. They should be declared as individual amounts. How can we as their employers make a decisions as to whether or not the budget line allotted to this is too high or not if we can't break it down? Considering we the members are their employers we should be privy to this information."

Response - There are a number of reasons why members shouldn't know individual staff wages, Privacy being a big one of them. The Membership are our employers but they have elected their representatives who are the Board Members, the Board has delegated their employer responsibilities to the GM and the Personnel Committee. If a member has concerns about the wages of staff members they should be directing a letter to the Board, the GM or the Personnel Committee.

Green Dream Survey Questions and Comments

- 1. The majority of comments were similar to the following:
 - Love the work they do, well worth the money.
 - As a senior I am very happy Green Dreams is here, it is hard for me to maintain my yard and sidewalk. I don't want to have to rely on my neighbours.
 - Sarcee Meadows has never looked better. I have a lot of comments from friends and visitors about how much better it is looking since Green Dream has been here.
 - Very pleasant and positive team. The young men are very professional and helpful.
- 2. We would like advance notice before they start doing the spring clean-up. The high powered blowers send gravel and debris at the cars, some members felt their cars were being sand blasted. Overall though this member felt the team did well grounds look nice and the sidewalks were clear in the winter. Would like some SMHC Members to have pride in their yards by removing debris, garbage and weeds. Suggested reminders for Members to water their yards as well. This would help Green Dream do their job.
 - Green Dream was spoken to about the blowers and spring clean-up. They will be making every effort to direct the debris away from cars.
 - Will Green Dream be doing large bushes and hedges? Yes, if you need your hedges or bushes trimmed please let the office know, this way the work can be directed to the appropriate person whether it be our arborist Tom or Green Dream.
- 3. A Member wrote their concerns about the hedges, the length of the grass and the noise of the blowers for snow removal.
 - If you need your hedges or bushes trimmed please let the office know, this way the work can be directed to the appropriate person whether it be our arborist Tom or Green Dream.
 - Generally grass does better when it is left longer, especially in Alberta. There is a wide range of preferences when it comes to how long grass gets kept and how often it is mowed. Green Dream has a standard length for all of Sarcee Meadows and cannot raise or lower their equipment per lawn to cater to preferences. Sometimes the grass will get longer due to unexpected growth, weeks of wet weather and areas that are missed. If you feel your lawn or a common area was missed, please let the office know. Green Dream will attend to it promptly.
 - Noise of blowers, yes they are noisy, Green Dream has tried to vary their schedule during the winter to vary when this noise happens. I.e.: one section will not constantly be hearing blowers at 7am. Snow blowers are generally industry standard now because they do remove snow more

quickly and efficiently with less damage to the surrounding grass under the snow. Green Dream does follow up with salt and ice/footprint removal.

- 4. Green Dream never shows up the same time or day, don't wear safety equipment and damages the wood of my fence or deck.
 - In the spring and fall the schedule can be varied, less mowing is needed and Green Dream is working on spring or fall clean-up. They do work to keep to the mowing schedule, but sometimes weather will prevent this.
 - Safety equipment is the responsibility of Green Dream, not SMHC. Green Dream pays their own WCB and other personnel expenses.
 - The wood around SMHC is being damaged by the whipper-snippers that Green Dream uses. SMHC has spoken to them about this. They will be trying to find the balance between a wire that will work efficiently for them but minimize the impact to our wooden surfaces.
- 5. Green Dream is cutting the lawn too short. It would help them if Members would water.
- 6. Please provide spring schedule sooner and spring clean-up was missed in some yards. Snow removal was acceptable although the blowers are noisy and irritating. Lot Plowing was unacceptable and the attitude of owners was unprofessional.
- 7. Concerns about costs, wondering how we came up with the figure of Green Dream costing the same or just a little bit more than it did before.
 - Prior to this year the cost of lawn care and snow removal, or other services that Green Dream provides has been spread throughout the budget. Because it is now listed all in one place it seems like it is costing much more. The cost outlines have been presented in newsletters and at the budget meeting. These presentations show there is very little cost difference between what Green Dream charges and other years when we have hired seasonal staff to do the work. Green Dream also has the ability to do much more for Sarcee Meadows, than our previous seasonal staff.

We are opening one of the lids on the garbage bins because some of our members cannot open them to get their garbage in. Please leave at least one side open. Thank you.

The City of Calgary deadline of November 2017 for the Green Cart Food and Yard Waste Program is now here! We are pleased to see that we are progressing very well here in Sarcee Meadows on being ready for this program however there is still some work to do in order for us all to remain compliant with this new bylaw. If you require an additional kitchen catcher bin for your organic recycling please notify the office by November 15th, 2017. They are \$10.00 each.

Please be advised that because the Food and Yard Waste Program is now City wide, the Community Drop-off Sites for Leaves and Pumpkins has been suspended. You may now put your discarded Halloween pumpkins directly into the small green organic recycling bins (NOT the large garbage bins). Fall leaves and yard waste can also be put into the small green organic recycling bins.

ECO ALLEY - NEWS YOU CAN USE - REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE!

At the recent Members Meeting held on October 21st we had an Organic Recycling Presentation provided by Katy Thompson from Waste Management. There were many excellent questions asked and lots of tips and information provided. Some of the highlights are provided here, further information can also be found on the City of Calgary's "What Goes Where" site at www.calgary.ca/whatgoeswhere.



Cups, rinsed and cleaned Plastic 1-7 larger than a credit card Cardboard with plastic parts separated Flyers and newspaper Coloured glass Clean foil Plastic bags – bagged within one bag

Organic Recycling:

Garbage:

Lids
Tin foil with food waste on it
Styrofoam
Binders unless they are separated
Coffee pod tin lid
Plastic tablecloths
Broken glass
Diapers and feminine hygiene
Pumps on bottles

Recycle

Soiled paper and cardboard
Pet waste including kitty litter – in compostable bags only
Coffee and the mesh
Newspaper
Kleenex, paper towel, napkins
Cooking oil
Only use compostable bags not biodegradable

Other Recycling:

Paint cans can be taken to the fire hall or some hardware stores Aerosol spray cans at the City or fire hall Wood can be taken to some recycling centers

- Labels do not need to be removed anymore just make sure the jar or can is clean. Plastic bands do not need to be removed. The plastic lid are garbage.
- Mixed recycling does not need to be separated.
- You don't have to use bags the kitchen catcher is washable.
- Food decomposes in 5 10 days which can lead to fruit flies. Adding paper towels, etc. can absorb moisture and reduce the flies. Apple cider vinegar in a dish or gar with plastic cover with holes, or add water and dish soap no cover needed.
- If compostable bags are used for your organics there will be little to no smell.
- Check with local schools to see what they are collecting.
- Any paper/cardboard that gets wet with rain and snow will be dried at the facility.
- We will look for and provide contamination statistics.
- If garbage does not fit or cannot be compacted it cannot go in the garbage bin. Save it for the "Big Bin" or call companies like 1-800-Got-Junk.

Organic Recycling Presentation Katy Thompson – Waste Management

Overview:

- O Cups, rinsed and cleaned, are recyclable no lids.
- o If you are unsure or not able clean it goes in the garbage.
- Greasy boxes cannot go in recycling.
- o Foil wrappers are not recyclable.
- o Plastics number 1-7 are recyclable, but not if it is smaller than a credit card.
- Labels do not need to be removed anymore as long as it is clean. Plastics band do not to be removed, lids are garbage.
- Soiled paper and cardboard can go into the compost/organic.
- Styrofoam is garbage always.
- o Mixed recycling does not need to be separated anymore.
- o Remove staples.
- o Cardboard with plastic parts can be separated.
- o Pet waste, including litter, bagged in a compostable bags is okay despite what the bin says.

- Do not to use bags in kitchen catcher bins are washable.
- Food decomposes in 5-10 days which can lead to fruit flies. Adding paper towels, etc. can absorb
 moisture reducing flies. Apple cider in a dish or jar with plastic cover with holes, or add water and
 dish soap no cover needed.
- Talk to office if you need more bins order by November 15 \$10.00.
- o Binders would be garbage or take it apart.
- o 935 yards a year with the bins we have diverted to organics rather than landfills
- Keurig pods can be separated coffee in organics, foil in garbage, and plastic in recycling. Some are now 100% compostable.
- o Flyers and newspapers are still recycling newspapers are also organics.
- Plastic table cloths are garbage.
- o If everything is bagged in organics there will be little to no smell.
- o Kleenex, paper towel, napkins are all organics.
- Colored glass is now acceptable. Broken glass is always garbage.
- o Check with locals schools to see what they are collecting.
- If there is any food residue it is garbage.
- o Diapers and feminine hygiene products are garbage.
- o Foil needs to be clean.
- o Plastic bags need to be bagged within one bag to be easily pulled off the belt.
- Only compostable bags in organics, not biodegradable. Biodegradable breaks down into little pieces of plastic eventually.
- Aerosol spray cans can be recycled at city or fire halls.
- o "What Goes Where?" on City website is a valuable tool.
- Some hardware stores take back paint cans.
- Pumps on bottles are garbage.
- Wet paper will be dried out at facility once it is collected.
- We will look for and provide contamination statistics.
- Cooking oil goes in organics.
- o If garbage does not fit or cannot be compacted it cannot go in the garbage bin. Save it for the "Big Bin" or call 1-800-Got Junk or similar.
- Some recycling centers have a wood bin.

CO-OP EDUCATION:

In keeping with common practices among many cooperatives, including housing cooperatives, SMHC has a long history of having many committees in place to assist the Board of Directors with much of the work that they do. As with anything our committee structure has evolved, changed, and adapted as needed in the nearly 50 years since SMHC was incorporated. To help understand some of the recent changes and to encourage our members to continue their rich tradition of committee involvement please see the following Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) below:

Committee Changes – FAQ

1. Which committees have been affected by the committee structure change?

Five out of fifteen committees have been affected by the committee structure change. The Finance Committee, Grievance and Resolution Committee, Membership Committee, Personnel Committee, and Property Maintenance Committee are the five committees that have been affected.

2. What does the application process look like?

An application to any of the five committees can be picked up from the office. The application itself consists of two questions:

- 1. Why do you want to join this committee?
- 2. What do you have to offer to this committee?

Once the application is filled out, the application is to be returned to the office at which point the applicant's name will be removed from the form. The anonymous application will be sent to the Board of Directors for consideration at their next available Regular Board Meeting.

3. What other changes were made aside from adding an application requirement?

Term limits were applied to committee members as well as a set minimum and maximum number of how many committee members can sit on a committee.

4. Can I apply to multiple committees and/or sit on multiple committees?

Yes, you may apply to multiple committees. You may sit on more than one committee at a time whether you are selected by the Board when an application is required or if you choose to join any of other ten committees where an application is not required.

5. Why were changes made in the first place?

SMHC committee members were consulted in June of 2016 regarding the committee structure through a survey. One survey was distributed to every active committee member at that time. Out of the 96 surveys sent out, 57 were returned. Many surveys made a variety of comments that indicated a need for the committee structure to be changed and also provided suggestions on what those changes could be. The Board responded to the feedback by implementing a new structure and process that would help facilitate the changes that were requested by the community.

6. Can I sit in on a committee meeting even if I am not on the committee?

You may sit in on the non-confidential portion of a committee meeting even if you are not on the committee with the permission of the committee Chair. Whenever possible please request to attend the meeting at least one week prior to the meeting date. This allows for the committee to accommodate your request by setting up their committee agenda appropriately. Due to the nature of their business the

Personnel Committee and the Grievance & Resolution Committee would not be able to accommodate guests.

7. Can I get a copy of the committee minutes even if I am not on the committee?

The Minute Distribution Policy currently states that committee minutes are distributed to the Board of Directors, all other committee or task force chair people upon request, and to the members of that committee or task force. To gain access to the committee minutes please join/apply to the committee of interest, volunteer to be the Chair of a committee, or consider running for a position on the Board of Directors.

**Finance – meets the third Monday of the month – members selected by application – up to 9 members

WOMEN'S CIRCLE:

November is Epilepsy Awareness Month

A member of our Women's Circle shares her personal journey with epilepsy as her son bravely faces this illness head on.

It's ironic that our family's journey with epilepsy began during a month dedicated to raising awareness of a disease we knew nothing about. We knew what epilepsy was, of course, and some basics, like 'don't put a spoon in the mouth of someone having a seizure' and 'in the middle ages, epileptics were incorrectly believed to be possessed by the devil', but during our son's first massive seizure, that knowledge was useless. NOT ONCE did the 911 dispatcher ask if there were demons involved, and I didn't have a single spoon with me to purposely avoid using.

After a tense holiday season filled with hospital visits, neurological evaluations, EEG's and MRI's, our son received a diagnosis from his neurologist. He has epilepsy- a disorder characterized by recurrent, unprovoked seizures, often with no underlying cause.

Like any mom whose child's health is in question, I immediately started reading anything I could get my hands on, and educated myself as much as possible. In the last 3 years I have learned a lot of great stuff, and collected (and ignored) a lot of useless information. I'm sharing today what I wish I had known back then.

- A seizure doesn't always look like it does on TV. The massive seizure that first alerted us to our son's condition was preceded by tons of others we hadn't noticed. He was falling down a lot, and seemed to be ignoring us. He wasn't paying attention at school, and his short-term memory was shot. He never seemed rested in the morning, and we often had trouble prying him out of bed. Until our neurologist explained these were seizures (or their side effects), we thought he was just clumsier than normal.
- **Epilepsy can surprise you.** Things can be great for weeks or months, and in the space of a few days, your child's health can spiral completely out of control. All it takes is one late dose of medicine, or one trigger too many, and all of a sudden, you're dealing with a 'sick kid'. Appreciate the good times- seize the day.
- Epilepsy can't kill you, but the complications can. People with epilepsy slip in the shower. They swim without life jackets (and seize, and drown). They walk in front of cars, or they drink too much and have uncontrolled seizures. 1 in 1,000 of them succumb to SUDEP (Sudden Unexplained Death in Epilepsy), and depression is nearly unavoidable- the suicide rate is 22% higher in epileptics than in the rest of the population. We are always hyper-vigilant.
- Follow the neurologist's advice. Take your meds on time and in the proper dosage. Although Anti-Epilepsy Drugs (AED's) can have some pretty awful side effects, they won't kill you, whereas uncontrolled seizures can. Studies are finally being conducted on the use of cannabis products in the treatment of epilepsy, but they're still in progress- until these studies are complete, experimenting with your meds (be they traditional or alternative) can be incredibly dangerous. Trust that your doctor is doing the best they can for your specific needs.
- Take care of yourself. Caregivers are especially hard on themselves and should know that they are only human. They are doing the best they can, and they deserve to seek support in whatever way makes sense to them. Utilize your resources, family, friends and community, whether medical or social supports. Having a child with an illness is not a failure.

Above all else, people with epilepsy just want their dignity. It's beyond embarrassing for our son to have a seizure in public, and the last thing he needs is to be treated differently. Please- don't tiptoe around it. If you have questions- ask. If someone affected by it wants to discuss it- listen. As the parents of a child with epilepsy, we want nothing more than to educate you and make his world a little easier.


