GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT:



TIPS FROM THE MAINTENANCE TEAM

Maintenance Supervisor: Please do not leave your front entry door open in the winter while it is cold. It creates too much moisture from the warm air hitting extreme cold and can freeze your door shut! This causes a safety hazard for yourself with the possibility of not being able to get out.

General: Remember to check your Smoke Detectors and CO Detectors. Let the office know if the detectors are expired or have reached "end of life".

Plumbing: Call in work orders right away if your taps are leaking and/or if the handles are loose and wiggly to prevent having to replace them prematurely.

Carpentry: With the cold weather the windows will really be frosted up these days. If you have slider windows check to make sure they are properly in place.

Cabinetry: When putting in a work order for closet doors please let us know which type of doors they are i.e. metal, wood, etc. The different styles require different parts when they need work.

Electrical: Any indication of dimming lights, flickering lights, a sizzling sound, or a burning odor will require immediate attention! Call in a work order right away if you notice these issues.

Locksmith: With the cold weather you may notice that your doors are shifting and may fit a little tighter. When it warms up they will move back to their old positions.

HVAC: Stay on top of changing your furnace filters. Keep an eye on your condensate pump and watch for signs of failure. i.e. water on the floor around your furnace.

Christmas Carols - "The 12 Days of Christmas" & "White Christmas"

I wanted to find out who wrote these two famous Christmas carols and thought I would share what I found out with you.

The "12 Days of Christmas" references the 12 days following Christmas, also known as Twelvetide in Christianity. The period begins with the birth of Christ on December 25 and ends with the coming of the three Wisemen on January 6, also known as Epiphany or Three Kings Day. The weeks before Christmas are known as Advent - hence, the creation of Advent calendars.

The first appearance of the song was in an English Children's book "Mirth With-out Mischief" which was published in 1780. Most historians believe that the Christmas carol started out as a "memory-and-forfeit" game in 1800's England. In 1909 Frederic Austin was known to popularize the arrangement of the song we know today.

The lyrics for the song are: A Partridge in a Pear Tree, 2 Turtle Doves, 3 French Hens, 4 Calling Birds, 5 Golden Rings, 6 Geese A-laying, 7 Swans A-swimming, 8 Maids A-milking, 9 Ladies Dancing, 10 Lords A-leaping, 11 Pipers Piping, and 12 Drummers Drumming.

Here is a fun fact about the "12 Days of Christmas" tune. Since 1984 PNC Bank has been tracking the price of each gift mentioned in the song. The PNC Bank Price Index uses current market rates to calculate the

cost of each gift and if you gave someone every gift mentioned in the song it would cost you approximately \$41,205.58. Partly, this is because swans are very expensive (\$1,875.00 each).

"White Christmas" was written by Irving Berlin, a Russian-born immigrant who, interestingly enough, did not celebrate Christmas as he was Jewish. Berlin's three-week old son had died on Christmas Day in 1928, so every year on December 25, he and his wife visited their baby's grave. The kind of deep secret of the song may be that he was responding in some way to his melancholy about the loss of his son.

The song "White Christmas" was written by Berlin for the musical film "Holiday Inn" released in 1942. Accounts vary as to when Berlin wrote the song, but one story suggests that he wrote it in 1940. The first public appearance of the song was by Bing Crosby on his NBC radio show "The Kraft Music Hall" on Christmas Day, 1941.

Bing Crosby sang this song in the films "White Christmas" and "Holiday Inn" and over the years "White Christmas" has been sung by many with the version sung by Bing Crosby being the world's best-selling single.

I have no doubt these carols will continue to be sung for many years to come.

The Geminids meteor shower is considered to be one of earth's most spectacular and reliable annual meteor showers! It has already begun, and lasts from around December 4th to 20th, but this year it's peak will be on the night of December 13th - 14th. Under perfect conditions (a clear sky and new moon), up to 120 meteors will be visible per hour! Though the moon conditions are not perfect this year, with a nearly full waning gibbous, with clear skies it is likely we will still see around 30 - 40 meteors per hour.

The shower is named Geminids after the constellation, Gemini, since it appears to originate from there from our perspective on the earth. The constellation is not actually the source for the shower, but it is a useful tool for casual viewers to locate the best viewing space. The shower actually comes from an asteroid called 3200 Phaethon, which orbits the sun, and completes an orbit about once every 1.4 years. As it orbits, it leaves behind small bits and pieces of itself that flake off as it travels through space, which hang suspended in the vacuum of space. Then, every December, as the earth orbits the sun, we pass through this trail of discarded asteroid pieces, which strike our atmosphere and light up the night sky.

The shower will be visible all over the world, and is best viewed at night or in the pre-dawn hours, starting around 9 or 10pm. For the best viewing, find an area well away from the light pollution of the city, and lie down on your back with your feet facing south. It can take around 30 minutes for your eyes to adjust fully to the dark, so be sure to wear warm clothes and bring blankets!



Hanukkah

Hanukkah is an eight day Jewish festival, also known as the festival of lights. The reason for Hanukkah is based on the story of the Maccabees battle with Greeks. It is told that one pure bottle of olive oil lasted for eight days in the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. It should have lasted only for the first day. (www.wincalendar.com/ca/hanukkah) This phenomenon is considered a miracle.

Maccabees was a priestly family leading a Jewish revolt that begun in 168 B.C. against Hellenism and Syrian rule and reigning over Palestine from 142 B.C to 63 B.C.(www.google.com/search?q=maccabees)

This year, Hanukkah begins at sunset on Sunday, December 18, 2022 and ends at sunset on Monday. December 26, 2022. On each day one candle is lit each night for eight nights on Menorah (an eight branched candelabra).

In Calgary, during the Hanukkah celebrations, one prominent Menorah is set up at the entrance to Heritage Park and one at the Municipal Building, where traditionally the Jewish community and Calgarians gather to celebrate the start of Hanukkah.

In memory of joyful occasion several families display Menorah in their windows with lit candles.

Each day, while one of the eight candles are lit, several traditional foods are enjoyed around the table with family and friends. Millions of sufganiyot (jelly donuts) are eaten in Israel and around the globe, as well as potato pancakes (Latkes) and Fudge Cakes. Kosher wine is shared as well.

Gifts for children are exchanged and traditional songs are enjoyed. The most popular song is called Maoz Zur, 'The Rock of our Salvation'.(www.wincalendar.com/ca/Hanukkah)

One of the most popular games played during this Jewish holiday of lights, is the Dreidel game. Dreidel is a wooden spinning top, four sided. On each side there is a letter from Hebrew alphabet written and it stands for Nun, Gimel, Hay and Pay – which stands for Nais Gadol Hayah Poh –"a Great miracle happened here".(
www.wincaledar.com/ca/Hanukkah)
