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Land Acknowledgement

For hundreds of years the people of Treaty 7 region have been building communities on the land known as Moh'kinsstis. The Blackfoot Confederacy (comprising the Siksika, Piikani, and Kainai First Nations), as well as the Tsuut'ina First Nation, the Stoney Nakoda (including the Chiniki, Bearspaw, and Wesley First Nations) and Métis Nation of Alberta, Region 3 have been the protectors of this land. They have made their homes here, shared their stories here, educated their youth and continued their traditions here.

Sarcee Meadows is honoured to continue this tradition of creating inclusive communities and to celebrate this territory we now call home.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

We have officially begun the Retrofit. Thank you to every Member who has been involved in planning the project, who has asked questions, offered insight, or attended our meetings. Earlier this week, CANA began the process with the assembly of the construction offices. Beginning next week, we will start selective demolition on Buildings 44 & 41.

While I will have a full update, including the updated schedule for each unit, next week I wanted to pass along a couple of notes regarding the retrofit today.

During construction, workers will be present around the units Monday to Friday from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm daily. Longer times may occasionally be required to deal with an unforeseen issue such as making weatherproof or safe for the night. While no workers will be parking on site, there may be times where we need to work with individual members to use their parking space. In each case we will work with the Member to provide alternative parking arrangements.

We also need to ask every Member to respect the safety protocols during construction. Active construction zones will be fenced off and signs will be displayed. Please do not enter a construction zone as this could be unsafe for both you and the workers.

After thorough research and discussions over the last several months, the Property Maintenance Committee is recommending two additions to the list of acceptable Home Improvements. Effective immediately, any member may install a bidet toilet seat in either their main floor or upstairs bathroom. The Property Maintenance Committee has selected a specific model of bidet seat that can be used in Sarcee Meadows. If you are interested in having one installed, please submit a Home Improvement Request and we will work with you on this.



The Property Maintenance Committee is also recommending the conversion of bathtubs to showers in our units. This approval is limited to Members who require this for accessibility or health reasons. We will be working with the Residential Access Modification Program (RAMP) through the province, who can help fund this conversion, so documentation will be required showing the need based on either accessibility or health. If you would like to discuss this further, please contact Mike Read or Jon Van Camp.

Most of you will by now have seen the new lids on the garbage and recycling bins. These were installed so that the lids could be closed and then easily opened by Members. By having our bins closed it helps prevent birds or other animals from getting into the bins and strewing the contents all over. We need Members help when putting garbage in the bins. When possible, please try to push the garbage or recycling to the sides of the bin so we don't end up with a pyramid in the middle of the bin. A little bit of time and care will help other Members and help ensure the areas around the bins don't end up with materials strewn all over.

We also need every Member to be aware of what they are putting in the recycling bins. When nonrecyclable materials are put in the recycling bins Sarcee Meadows is charged a "Contamination Fee." This increases our costs and could result

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in higher housing charges as a result. If you are unsure what bin to dispose something in, please contact the office and we will help you.

I hope everyone enjoyed Halloween and you got your share of chocolate! We are heading into my favourite time of year, Christmas! I am looking forward to walking Sarcee Meadows and seeing all the Christmas lights on the units.

Work Order Performance

Beginning this month, we will include in the newsletter a summary of work order performance over the last month. The goal of this is to show the performance we are achieving in our Maintenance Team.

Over the last month you will see we have closed 475 work orders which is the highest we have achieved this year, while maintaining our average number of days to close. The slight increase we saw in average days to close is resulting from our continued efforts to clear the backlog of kitchen replacement that was caused by supply issues — our previous supplier closed operations after being back ordered for a number of months and our new supplier experienced some delays as we were onboarded.


We are also at our lowest number of open work orders for the year.



FROM THE TEAM AT B50

Office Hours & Closures: Our office hours are Monday to Friday, 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. The office staff can always be reached by phone or email whether in the office or working at home.

The shop and office will be closed on Monday, November 13th, 2023 in lieu of Remembrance Day.

New Mail Carrier: Most of our members and residents have probably noticed by now that our area has a new Canada Post Mail Carrier. While he is doing a great job so far, there are ways that we can help him out while he learns the area.

First, please ensure that every possible person or entity that could potentially send you mail has your complete and correct mailing address with the proper unit number. This includes all companies, organizations, banks, employers, agencies from all levels of government, clubs, charities, societies, magazine and catalogue subscriptions, friends and family, and so on.

Second, it is very important that you inform the office immediately of any new residents in your unit, especially if they might also be getting mail delivered to them.

Every day the office can get a pile of mail with missing, incorrect, or incomplete unit numbers. When we are lucky enough to find the name of the addressee as a member or resident in our database we can add the missing details for our mail carrier to deliver on the next business day. However, when we can't find the name or don't know of a new resident, these items are marked "Return to Sender". Either way these are delays in you or your residents receiving potentially important mail in a timely manner.



<u>Community Garbage Cans:</u> We are fortunate that our little community has many green spaces to enjoy and miles of sidewalks to stroll through for a little exercise or just to get a breath of fresh air. In an effort to keep these areas clean there are a number of small garbage cans throughout the complex

These are great for disposing of empty Slurpee cups or snack wrappers after a trip to 7-11 or empty coffee cups after getting your daily dose of caffeine at Starbucks. They are also handy for disposing of pet waste while walking your dog, if you haven't switched to compostable bags yet.

However, these small garbage cans are **not meant** to be used for household garbage. They really aren't designed for large quantities or for big items. When they get overstuffed with inappropriate garbage items there is no more room for the type of waste they were intended for. Plus, the bags can break and cause more of a mess to be cleaned up.

Please be sure that only the appropriately labeled blue garbage bins are being used to dispose of all household garbage and larger garbage items.

Winter Furnace Care: With winter on its way in and bringing us colder temperatures outside, most of us will be increasing the temperatures inside to stay cozy and warm.

With the increased furnace usage, it is important that you check your furnace filters on a regular basis and be sure to change them at least every 2 to 3 months, or more often if needed.

As always, filters are available for pick up at B50 for no charge. A reminder as well that the old, used filters are not recyclable and need to be disposed of in the proper garbage bin, not the recycling bins.

Lastly, any issues or problems with the furnaces and/or thermostats need to be called in or have a work order placed in Buildium immediately. This will help to avoid small issues turning into big issues requiring an emergency call. We do not want anyone to have to spend any amount of time without heat this winter, even temporarily.

MY TRIP TO THE HOLY LAND

Last month, I fulfilled a lifelong dream of visiting Jordan, Jerusalem, Mecca, and Madina for pilgrimage. I had been praying to go to these sacred places for as long as I can remember. My time in Jerusalem was spiritually awakening but also filled with a different level of trauma. I am thankful for my therapist; I don't know how I would have been able to process it.

The challenges began with the border experience, what the GPS indicated would take less than 2 hours ended up taking 8 hours. I was separated from my husband. From the border to our hotel, we encountered multiple checkpoints where IDF soldiers would enter our bus. Despite these difficulties, we were blessed to pray in the almost empty mosque four out of five times, visit the Church of the Sepulchre, go to Mt of Temptation, and explore the old city with a tour guide. Whether one is allowed to enter the Al-Aqsa Mosque or not is at the mercy of the IDF soldiers. To go from our hotel to the mosque, what should take a quick 10-minute walk would take us more than 45 minutes with checkpoints and oftentimes humiliation such as being called "Muslims are all pigs, to go die in Gaza" to being intimidated and provoked. The time we were not allowed in, we were pointed at with guns and told something so vile, I refuse to write it down. We were not allowed to visit the Church of Nativity, nor were we allowed to visit the Tomb of Abraham (peace be upon him). This was my experience as a tourist but to witness Palestinian Muslims and Christians living five minutes away and not being able to visit their holy site was more than painful. The walls, the electric fencing, the rigorous checkpoints were incredibly painful and inhumane.

After returning back and taking each day slowly, I have been more than grateful to be living in a peaceful country like ours. So much to be thankful for. I remind myself again not to stereotype and paint everyone from one community with the same paintbrush, and who would know that better than me. I continue to have friends from different faith groups including Judaism and Christianity and I cherish those friendships even more after coming back, we all go back to father Abraham (Peace

be upon him). When I get flashbacks I remind myself that this is not about one religion versus another but rather about the land, which unfortunately humans have been doing for far too long.

My experience has emphasized that we humans unfortunately keep repeating history, we remain silent when it's uncomfortable, we let a genocide unfold and perhaps condemn it a few hundred years later. Just like everyone, I too am learning about the history of that region more with sources other than the media outlets. I went in with a desire to pray without knowing much about the history and I came out thirsty for more knowledge. Just like everyone, I too am praying for a world where we humans can coexist peacefully. We all know too well that violence is not the answer.

NATIONAL CHILD DAY - NOVEMBER 20, 2023

In Canada, we recognize National Child Day on November 20 each year. The date was chosen as Canada's Day to celebrate children because the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) was adopted on November 20, 1989. Canada officially signed onto this UNCRC in 1991, making a commitment that all children are treated with dignity and respect and have opportunity to reach their full potential.

The commitment covered three main points that must be included for Canadian children:

- Providing children opportunities to have a voice (speak out & be heard)
- Protecting children from harm
- · Ensuring children's basic needs are met

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS AND CUSTOMS

As we get everything ready for Christmas I wanted to share with you some of the information I found regarding the various customs and traditions celebrated around the world.

In Norway, Christmas means hiding your mops and brooms - not because people don't want to clean, but because Norwegians are a little superstitious and want to prevent evil spirits who return to earth that night, from stealing the brooms and going on joyrides in the Christmas sky.

In Austria, a ghoulish creature called "Krampus", the evil accomplice of St. Nicholas, is said to wander the streets looking for badly behaved children. This happens during the month of December.

In Ukraine, the Ukrainians use decorations that mimic the formation of spiders' webs. They shimmer with dew and are used in place of the usual baubles, tinsel, and stars.

Moth, or Christmas caterpillar, is used and is covered in very festive hues - giving all who swallow one a little luck in the coming year.

Germany's age-old legend of the Christmas pickle is said to have derived from an effort to encourage children to take time to appreciate the ornaments on a Christmas tree rather than rushing to open gifts. It is a tradition in Germany to hide a pickle ornament as the last decoration placed on

the tree. Carefully hidden among the branches, the ornament is said to bring good fortune, as well as an extra gift from St. Nicholas to the first child who finds it on Christmas Day.

In Japan, people flock to the nearest Kentucky Fried Chicken to eat "Kurisumasu ni wa Kentakkii", also known as "Kentucky for Christmas". This tradition goes back to a marketing campaign in 1974 and to this day KFC records the highest sales volume each year on Christmas Eve.

In Slovakia and parts of Ukraine, Christmas Pudding, in all flavours and consistencies, not only warms the heart, but it can also predict the future. The oldest male of the family takes a spoonful of loksa pudding and throws it at the ceiling. The more pudding sticks, the more luck you will have.

In Caracas, Venezuela people don't just walk to mass on Christmas Eve, they roller skate. Parts of the city are even blocked off so everyone can safely skate to church.

In Italy forget Santa and December 25th as all the action takes place on the eve of January 5th. According to folklore, an old woman named Belfana visits all the children and fills their stockings and leaves presents if they have been good. Belfana is said to enter through the chimney and leave treats for the children who live theretypically wine and local delicacies.

I hope you enjoyed reading about some of the traditions and customs celebrated in some of the countries and cities around the world. Who knows, maybe you would like to make a new tradition in your home - say, fried caterpillars?
